# **From Your Pastor:**

Dear Friends,

Among the delights from this past weekend was having among us Pablo Estrella. He is a pastor in the Yucatan and has recently helped facilitate Living Waters projects in that region. His father, Jose Estrella, has long directed the Bethesda Medical Clinic, with which we have had a long relationship. In the last year, our mission funds have assisted in the construction of an operating room for the clinic and provided scholarships for nursing students. Pablo's visit this weekend was both a gesture of appreciation for what has happened and an expression of hope for a further development of our relationship. At Saturday's well-presented Mission in Motion event, Pablo offered the prayer before our meal, thanking God for the opportunity "to take the gospel to the ends of the earth."

It's an opportunity we often take for granted, even though it is at the heart of what Jesus would have us do. As Presbyterians, we are part of a church that continues to touch people around the world with the healing and hopeful word of God. At St. Philip, we have focused our mission efforts in a couple of particular regions. Our Mission in Motion program Saturday directed us to the international mission partnerships our congregation has in Bangladesh, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Peru, as well as in the Mexican border areas, and the Yucatan.

Certainly, we talk a lot about local mission and the ways we are engaging our community and reaching out in love to our neighbors. That's important and crucial. Yet, Scripture teaches us that God loves the whole world, not just Houston. So we do well to maintain a global perspective in our mission outreach.

In the coming weeks, we will hear more about the next Living Waters trip to the Yucatan and the mission trip to Peru our young people are planning for next June in conjunction with the presbytery. I can only imagine what further ideas Pablo Estrella's visit this weekend may have sparked!

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# The Houston Marathon "Run for a Reason"

Want to run in the Houston Marathon, but find the entries are closed? Here is a way to get your running shoes to going on January 18 and 19, 2014. The Chevron Houston Marathon's charity program, "Run for a Reason" is a means for charities to raise funds and awareness about their causes. In the past 18 years nearly \$17 million has been raised by runners who solicit donors for their charity. Last year, for the third consecutive year, the program passed the \$2 million mark. One of our mission partners here at St. Philip, is a charity participant in "Run for a Reason" again this coming year.

Presbyterian Children's Homes & Services (PCHAS), which receives no funding from General Assembly, depends solely on its private fundraising efforts, which includes the Chevron Houston Marathon. Each year PCHAS sets a goal for its participation in "Run for a Reason" to raise enough money to honor or remember each abused, abandoned or neglected child in the State of Texas the previous year, based upon \$1 for each innocent victim. This year the goal is \$64,366, an astounding number because of what it represents. Each year of its participation in the charity program of the Marathon, PCHAS has met or exceeded its goal of \$1 per victim. All of the money raised goes towards PCHAS programs: Group Homes for children, Single Parent Residences, Foster Care, Adoption, Education, and Child and Family, unique programs aimed at providing meaningful family case for children in crisis.

Each charity organization participating in "Run for a Reason" gets a number of entry spots for both the full and half marathons which are only available to runners who wish to benefit their chosen charity. These entries spots are called FFR ("Fundraising for Registration") entries and are guaranteed entries to the sold-out marathon. If you would like to participate in either the full or the half marathon on behalf of Presbyterian Children's Homes & Services, here is how it works.

You pay the registration fee (set by the Houston Marathon committee) directly to PCHAS. For the coming event, the Registration fee for the Full Marathon is \$125.00; for the Half Marathon, it is \$115.00. Either of these amounts will be charged to your credit card on November 4, 2013. In addition to the registration fee, each participant commits to raising \$250.00 from friends, family or businesses by January 15, 2014. In the event a participant has a balance of the \$250 remaining on that date, it will be considered a personal donation and PCHAS will charge that balance to the participant's credit card at You will be provided your own fundraising page through the "Run for a Reason" portal, and your donors will be receive tax deductible receipts.

Ars Lyrica Houston and the Music at St. Philip Concert Series will present "Music for a Princess" Saturday, November 16, 7:30 pm.

The program is family-friendly: children dressed in royal costumes (little princes and princesses) will be admitted free with the purchase of an adult ticket (one child per adult). Tickets (\$10 cash) are available at the door only.

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# The Penny Jar: Cents-ability Hunger Program at St. Philip

Have you wondered about that big jar full of coins that sits up in front of the sanctuary on the first Sunday of each month? That big jar is one of the ways our congregation helps fight hunger. Cents-ability began in 1975 when a group of Presbyterian Women in Florida pledged to give 2¢ per meal to help combat hunger in their community and beyond. The program grew, and it now is an important part of the PCUSA's Presbyterian Hunger Program (PHP). In 2012, PHP Cents-ability funds went to support a wide variety of programs aimed at food security, both here in the US and around the globe. A few examples:

+NAGARTA Water for Life, Niger - digging wells to provide safe water for drinking and for food production in drought-stricken areas of Niger.

+Presbytery of Boston Food Justice Young Adult Volunteer Project – young adults living in intentional Christian community and working to secure healthy and sustainable food, especially for those living in 'food deserts' in Boston.

+World Hunger Relief, Elm Mott, TX – developing school and community gardens and farmers' markets to address food insecurity and nutrition in poor communities.

Here at St. Philip, we send half of what we collect to the national Presbyterian Hunger Program, and the other half stays here to support hunger programs in the Houston community.

Taking part in Cents-ability is easy, and it's something that anyone can do. Set aside just a few cents a day, and on the first Sunday of each month bring your pennies to drop in the coin jar. That resonant jingle of coins dropping into the jar reminds us of all that we have and all we can share. "Happy are those . . . who give food to the poor." (Psalm 146: 5-8)

If you'd like a reusable plastic Cents-ability coin cup to set out on your table, just ask Cathy Patterson or Jo Helland for one.

# The Story of Kristallnacht

November 10, 2013, marks the 75th anniversary of Kristallnacht. Ruth Brown, a Houston-area Holocaust survivor and docent at Holocaust Museum Houston, will tell the story of Kristallnacht, and how it affected her and her family when they lived in Düsseldorf, Germany. During the two days of Kristallnacht, Hitler's Third Reich burned over a thousand synagogues; trashed and looted 7,000 Jewish businesses; killed dozens of Jewish people; and looted Jewish hospitals, cemeteries, schools, and homes while police and fire brigades stood by and did nothing. After Kristallnacht, the Nazis sent 30,000 German Jewish men to concentration camps.
